PROGRAM DESIGN AND MANAGEMENT (PDM)

- The Policy Council's monthly training was in the Eligibility, Recruitment, Selection, Enrollment, and Attendance (ERSEA) service area. They also discussed the establishing of procedures and criteria for recruiting, selecting and enrolling children.
- The Council was also made aware that the management team service area staff are continuing to participate in trainings on the New Head Start Program Performance Standards. These training have been hosted and/or facilitated by the Office of Head Start, Region IV Office of Head Start, and the Florida Head Start Association.

Eligibility, Recruitment, Selection, Enrollment, and Attendance (ERSEA)/Disabilities

Recruitment

- Recruitment for 2017 2018 school year will being in February. Children must be 2, 3 or 4 years old by September 1, 2017, live in Santa Rosa County and are eligible for the program based on the federal family income guidelines or other Head Start eligibility guidelines. Children that are homeless or in foster care are categorically eligible.
- Head Start services are available to those students who are 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2017 at Bagdad Elementary, Berryhill Elementary, Central School, East Milton Elementary, Jay Elementary, T. R. Jackson Pre-K Center and West Navarre Primary.
- T. R. Jackson Pre-K Center will serve students who are 2, 3 or 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2017.

PARENT, FAMILY AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (PFCE)

- The family services team met for a half day to review our work from the first semester, project our work for the remainder of the school year and plan for the 2017-18 school year. We evaluated our strengths and weaknesses, and identified a number of changes we will implement in our services for the new school year.
- The Student and Family Services Specialist attended a two day training on the New Rule update to the Head Start Performance Standards. There will be a few minor changes in the way we manage family services and mental health, but for the most part, our programs current high quality practices are already meeting or exceeding the requirements.
