## **CHAPTER 5.00 – STUDENTS**

## ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATION

- I. Any medication, either prescription or nonprescription, to be administered to a student on school premises or at school functions (including field trips) must be brought to the school by the parent/guardian/authorized adult representative for retention and administering. No student will be allowed to have medication, prescription or nonprescription, with the exception of an epinephrine auto-injector, an asthma inhaler, an insulin pen, or medication for pancreatic insufficiency or cystic fibrosis in his or her possession on school premises, on a school bus, or at a school function. Students will be allowed to carry epinephrine auto-injectors, asthma inhalers, insulin pens, or medication for pancreatic insufficiency or cystic fibrosis with parental permission and physician's signature on the "Dispersion of Medication Form."
- II. Medication(s) brought to the school must be in the original prescription container, properly labeled with the child's name, doctor, name of medication, route, dosage, directions, and expiration date. A "Dispersion of Medication Form" must be completed for each prescription and a method of disposal of any unused or expired medication designated. The medication must be counted jointly by the parent or guardian and a school staff member, and the parent or guardian and school staff member must both sign the "Registry of Medication Form" when the initial prescription is brought to the school. A copy of the form can be found in the Health Services Manual.
- III. Parents are encouraged to request prescriptions for medications which limit administration during school hours. First morning doses should be given at home with only mid-day doses administered by a school staff member. Doses missed at home will not be administered by school staff.
- IV. Medication(s) will not be provided by the school except under the provisions of section VI.
- V. A diabetic student can be provided a diabetic plan developed using the "Guidelines for Managing Diabetes in the School Setting" form found in the Health Services Manual.
- VI. Administration of Emergency Medication

Schools may purchase and maintain a supply of epinephrine auto-injectors to use when a student, staff or faculty member is having an anaphylactic reaction. The medication shall be kept in a secure location accessible only to trained personnel. This epinephrine is for anaphylactic reactions where there is no epinephrine prescribed.

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- The School Board shall adopt a protocol, developed by a licensed Α. physician, for the administration of epinephrine in emergency situations.
- B. Only school personnel who are trained to recognize an anaphylactic reaction and certified to administer an epinephrine auto-injector or a person who is authorized by an authorized health care practitioner shall be permitted to administer this medication; however, the auto-injector may be given to a student, staff or faculty member who is authorized to selfadminister an epinephrine auto-injector.
- C. Under the provisions of Florida Statutes, the District, trained and certified personnel, or an uncertified person who administers an epinephrine autoinjector under the authorization of an authorized health care provider shall not be liable for any injury resulting from the administration of an autoinjector provided that school personnel were trained or authorized as provided by law, followed the established protocol and believed that the student was having an anaphylactic reaction.
