

• The readiness team met to go over the last observational period data reports. It was determined that the readiness skills that had not made as much progress would be placed on the portfolio to ensure a greater emphasis on those specific skills for the following school year. The goal was that students would show an increase of at least 50% in each domain. The chart below indicates that students exceeded the goal in each domain.

PARENT FAMILY AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (PFCE)

- Family Advocates and teaching staff conducted end of year conferences with our families during the month to review student academic progress, and family goal plans. While some of our families did not show effort in goal completion, many of our families reached goals that were attainable within the school year, while others showed progress toward completion of bigger goals.
- Our contracted Mental Health Professional recorded twenty-nine formal referrals and twelve additional informal
 consultations for a total of forty-one students served. She provided direct services to twenty-nine families, including
 three staff members. In addition to serving families through individualized service, she also provided group settings for
 families and staff.
- A community representative on the Policy Council, Becca McKeithen, was so moved by the needs of our families that she organized a summer food distribution the last week of school. Seventy-two of our families received a box of food and information about summer food programs in the area. You may remember, she steered an effort for our students at Christmas as well. Her exposure to the needs of families living in poverty in Santa Rosa County through the Head Start Program has led Becca and a friend to establish a non-profit organization to provide Christmas break and summer food boxes/bags for families starting with Head Start, and with a goal to impact every student engaged in backpack programs in every school in Santa Rosa County.
- The Family Services Specialist attended a train the trainer for the National Family Development Credential (FDC) offered by the Center for the Study of Culture, Health, and Human Development at the University of Connecticut. Beginning November 1, 2016, all new hires serving as Family Advocates in the Head Start program are required at a minimum, within eighteen months of hire to have a credential in family services. This training will allow our staff to be trained in house. We can also offer this training to other agencies. The course requires eighty hours of seat time and ten hours of portfolio review.
